New Transition Joint Guidance issued by ISBE/IDPH (March 9, 2021)

Through executive orders, guidance must be followed by school districts

 Updated Transition Joint Guidance prevails in the event of any conflict with guidance previously issued by IDPH and ISBE

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Introduction

Introduction

- Joint guidance supports the return to in-person instruction was soon as practicable in every Illinois community.
- In-person instruction should be prioritized over extracurricular activities, including sports and school events, to minimize risk of transmission in schools and protect in-person learning
- Guidance leaves it up to local control, in consultation with the health department, regarding whether to host safe and socially distanced events such as open houses, registration, prom, graduation ceremonies, and other extracurricular events.

 - Social Distancing/Space Limitations

 - Risk Management/Tort Immunity

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Social Distancing/ Space Limitations

 May school districts allow less than three feet of social distancing if that is the only way to return to full inperson instruction?



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 How should school districts measure "3 to 6 feet" for purposes of laying out classrooms?

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Social Distancing/ Space Limitations

 Are there situations where school districts must still provide at least six feet of social distancing between students and/or staff?



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 What are some of the factors school districts should consider when deciding whether to allow students to be seated in the classroom less than six feet apart (but no less than three feet apart) in a specific situation?

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Social Distancing/ Space Limitations

 Are there any exceptions to the quarantine protocol for a "close contact"?

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 Based on the new Joint Guidance, are there any changes to the capacity limits in individual rooms or spaces?



 Can a school district deny a student access to in-person learning if a student cannot wear a face covering due to a medical or disability related condition?




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Face Coverings

 Should school districts have a face covering policy in place?

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Screenings (Symptom and Saliva)

 If school districts are no longer doing symptom screenings and temperature checks at the door, what options do they have for selfcertification?

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Screenings (Symptom and Saliva)

 May school districts use or continue to use saliva-based surveillance as a part of the district's regular symptom screening process?



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
Screenings (Symptom and Saliva)

 If school districts are no longer going to offer a remote instructional option for all students, can the district mandate saliva screening for students?

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Remote Instruction

 Are school districts still required to offer a remote instruction option for any students and families who request such?

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Remote Instruction

 Since school districts only need to provide a remote option for students at increased risk of severe illness and/or for students who live with individuals who are at increased risk of severe illness, can the school district require medical documentation of the condition that makes them at increased risk of severe illness?

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Remote Instruction

 Do school districts have to offer remote instruction when a student is out of school in quarantine due to a close contact or COVID positive case?

 How does the new guidance around remote instruction impact extended school year offerings and 2021-22 return to school planning?


